Attached will be found form I-404 covering record of the subject's arrival here ex SS "Persia" July 29, 1913. Our files indicate that the alien (and others of a group of East Indians arriving on the same vessel) were detained and that a warrant of arrest was obtained for the subject on the ground that he was likely to become a public charge at time of entry. A warrant of deportation based on that charge was issued October 10, 1913. It is indicated that the basis for the charge was a showing that there was no demand for East Indian labor in the area of his proposed destination.

The case of the subject and several other East Indians was carried to the Federal Courts through habeas corpus proceedings. The deportation order was upheld in the District and Circuit Courts. However, the U. S. Supreme Court in the interim handed down its decision in *Gegiow V. Uhl*, 36 S. Ct. 2, 239 U. S. 3, a New York case on all fours. Thereafter, informal notations in our files indicate that the then Solicitor General confessed error in the Supreme Court and the decision was reversed and the cause remanded without consideration.

Unfortunately, our records do not show any later action. Presumably, the subject was finally discharged under the writ and may therefore be considered as having entered for permanent residence July 29, 1913. Your files may reveal the final disposition.

That the said aliens are members of the excluded classes in that they were
persons likely to become public charges at the time of their entry into the

and may be deported in accordance therewith:

I, LOUIS F. POST, Acting Secretary of Commerce and Labor, by virtue
of the power and authority vested in me by the laws of the United States, do hereby
command you to return the said aliens to India, the country whence they
came, at the expense of the appropriation "Expenses of Regulating Immigration, 1914".
You are directed to purchase transportation for the aliens from San Francisco,
Cal., to their home in India, at the lowest scheduled steerage rate available,
payable from the above-named appropriation.

For so doing, this shall be your sufficient warrant.

- Q (to alien Bhagat Singh) Do you understand the interpreter? A. Yes.
Q Are you willing to proceed with this examination with this interpreter being satisfied that he will faithfully and correctly interpret the questions put to you and the answers thereto? A. Yes.
- Alien sworn -
Q What is your name? A. Bhagat Singh. I am twenty-two years old.
Q Did you arrive at this port on the SS "Persia" July 29, 1913 from Manila? A. Yes.
Are you married? A. No.
Q Where were you born? A. Goolvari in Amritsar District of the Punjab, India.
Q Are you a subject of Great Britain? A. Yes.
Q When did you leave your native land? A. Three years ago.
Q Where did you go to? A. Hong Kong, and from there I went direct to Manila.
Q When did you leave Hong Kong for Manila? A. About a month and a half ago.
Q What were you doing in Hong Kong? A. I was a watchman in Hong Kong. I got \$20. in Hong kong currency, (about \$10. gold) per month.
Q Why did you go to Manila? A. I heard that there were better prospects in Manila than in Hong Kong, so I went there. I read it in the newspapers and heard it from my countrymen.
Q Did any white man tell you that conditions were better in Manila? A. No.
Q What did you do while in Manila? A. I was a watchman there. I got 40 pesos a month. (20. gold)
Q Why did you not stay in Manila? A. I heard then that this was still a better country. I heard from my countrymen and I also read it in the newspapers, and heard from my people at home who wrote me letters.
Q Did any of these accounts say what wages you could make in the U.S.? A. No they gave no details, but they stated that this was a very good country and that wages were better than any other place, so I came here.
Q At the time you left Hong Kong for Manila did you intend to come to the mainland of the U.S.? A. When I first left for Manila I had no idea of coming here, but I made up my mind afterwards after hearing that this was such a good country.
Q Did anybody tell you that you would have to go to Manila first to come to the mainland of the U.S.? A. No.
Q What do you intend to do in the U.S.? A. Whatever work I can get I will do here.
Q You intend to go to work here as a laborer? A. Preferably I will do farming work if I can get it. If not I will do any other work that I can get a hold of.
Q Is it a fact then that you came to the mainland of the U.S. because you could not make sufficient money in Manila? A. I made a little money in Manila but of course wherever there is more money to be made, naturally I go there.
Q How much money did you have at the time you entered Manila? A. \$150. gold.
Q How much money have you now? A. \$50. gold. (shows same)
Q At the time you were admitted in Manila were you required to put up any bond that you would not become a public charge? A. No.

(Examiner's note: Alien presents certificate Form 546 P.I. No. 165, issued at the port of Manila May 24, 1913 indicating that he landed at that port from the SS. "Taisang" on the 18th of May 1913, signed by the insular collector of customs)

Arraignment:- You are now informed that you are taken into custody under the provisions of telegraphic Departmental warrant of arrest dated July 30, 1913, signed by A. B. Densmore, Acting Secretary of Labor, in which it is alleged that you were a person liable to become a public charge at the time of your admittance to the Philippine Islands. You are further informed that this hearing is given you for the purpose of giving you an opportunity to show cause if any you have why you should not be deported. You have the right to be represented by counsel and both you and your counsel have the right to inspect all the evidence and records in this case upon which the warrant is based.

- Q Do you wish to be represented by counsel? A. Yes I wish to be represented by counsel.
- Q Do you know who your attorney will be? A. No.

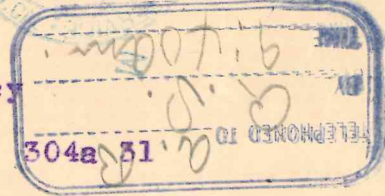

Above aliens likely to become public charges for the reason that they are of the laboring class, that there is no demand for such labor and there exists a strong prejudice against them in this locality.

(2) The present location and occupation of above-named alien are as follows:

Above aliens are now detained at this station.
