Q That is your name and age? A Catarino Lopes, 36 years old

Q Give the names of your wife and children? A Esther Galarza, wife, 34 years old, Gustavo, 8 years old, eldest child, Catarino, Jr. 7 years old and Alfonso, 3 years old

Where were you born? A San Plas, Mexico

Q Did you arrive at this port per se Peru, Sept. 14th? A Yes

Q Were you accompanied on that trip by your wife and three children? A Yes

Q Have you ever been in the United States before? A No

Q Have you any friends or blood relatives in the United States? A Yes.

My wife's brothers, my brothers-in-law

Q Are they in a position to assist you financially? A Yes

Q How much money have you now? A \$9.00

Q What is your business or occupation? A Camp laborer By Chairman: It is the unanimous opinion of the Board that inasmuch as two of the minor children of this alien have been certified as suffering from a dangerous, contagious disease, to wit: hookworm, they be excluded and ordered deported; that the parents also be deported as accompanying minor aliens suffering from a dangerous contagious disease. It will also be noted that the mother of the three minor children is certified as being pregnant six months; that the father has but 19.00 and the general appearance of the family indicates that they would in a short while become public charges; further that they be excluded as persons likely to become public charges. Alien is advised that if deported it will be at the expense of the steamship company bringing them here. From this decision you have the right of appeal. Ic you wish to appeal? A Yes

Q How old is he? A 20

Q He is making \$3.00 a day? A Yes

Q What class of work? A Irrigation work. We are taking out the old water system in the city of Sacramento and putting in new

Q Have you anything further you wish to say? A No

Q You have no further testimony to offer? A No. I have a job for this man to cut wood

By Chairman: Have you any further testimony you wish to offer at this time? A All I have to say is that I know I can go to work here and keep my family together. I came here with the expectation of going to work and keeping my family. Conditions in Mexico make it immossible to live there
