

QUESTIONS RELATING TO EXAMINATION OF ALIENS
FOR IMMIGRATION PURPOSES

1. Name and discuss briefly the general and the specific duties of U.S. Public Health Service officers assigned to immigration inspection work.
2. Name the diseases and conditions which are mandatorily excluded from admission into the United States, and discuss their certification.
3. (a) What four classes of diseases or physical defects are to be certified as Class B affections?
(b) Name one or more examples of each class.
4. (a) Distinguish between the terms "idiot", "imbecile" and "feeble-minded person" relative to the certification of aliens.
(b) Name several conditions certifiable as Class C affections.
5. (a) What eye condition, or conditions, are certifiable as Class A affections?
(b) What eye condition, or conditions, are certifiable as Class B affections?
6. (a) In order to certify to tuberculosis must tubercle bacilli be found on laboratory examination?
7. (a) How and under what circumstances are medical boards convened for the examination of aliens?
(b) How many officers constitute a board?
(c) Under what conditions may the alien present a medical witness to testify in his behalf, and how many such witnesses may testify?
8. (a) Describe the etiology, clinical appearance, and method of laboratory diagnosis of ringworm of the scalp, nails or beard.
(b) Under what conditions may syphilis be diagnosed and certified without the alien showing clinical manifestations of the disease?
9. Discuss the handling of aliens who have been examined abroad by officers of the U.S. Public Health Service. In what way is the approval of the medical officer abroad designated on the passport visas or transit certificates of immigrant and non-immigrant aliens?
10. (a) Discuss the diagnosis of leprosy, giving details of laboratory diagnosis.
(b) Give details of laboratory diagnosis of gonorrhoea.
(c) Give details of laboratory diagnosis of hookworm, describing the appearance of the ova.
